The novel is set against one of the most dramatic political chronicles of the twentieth century: the Congo's fight for independence from Belgium, the murder of its first elected prime minister, the CIA coup to install his replacement, and the insidious progress of a world economic order that robs the fledgling African nation of its autonomy. Its verses are inescapable. There have been efforts to ban the text. Ruth May becomes very sick and lies in bed for the majority of the day. She plays with words and is a lover of palindromes, with which her chapters are punctuated. Her twin Adah suffers from hemiplegia and, for much of the novel, cannot speak at all.
